Listen to what the Surgeon General of the United States has to say about condom use for anal sex in a Q & A:

Q. “Are condoms strong enough for anal intercourse?”

A. “Condoms provide some protection, but anal intercourse is simply too dangerous to practice.

“Condoms may be more likely to break during anal intercourse than during other types of sex because of the greater amount of friction and other stresses involved.

“Even if the condom doesn’t break, anal intercourse is very risky because it can cause tissue in the rectum to tear and bleed. These tears allow disease germs to pass more easily from one partner to the other.”

Trojan “Trojan brand Latex Condoms, when used properly, are highly effective against pregnancy – although no contraceptive can guarantee 100% effectiveness. **Any use of Trojan Brand Latex Condoms for other than vaginal intercourse can increase the potential of damage to the condom.**”

Lifestyles: “Although no contraceptive can guarantee 100% effectiveness, latex condoms, when properly used, are a highly effective means of preventing pregnancy without the serious side effects sometimes associated with some other methods. **Condoms are primarily intended for use in vaginal intercourse; other uses can increase the potential for breakage.**”

Durex: “”No method of contraception can provide 100% protection against pregnancy or HIV (AIDS) and STDs. **Non-vaginal use of condoms can increase the potential of them slipping or being damaged, please consult your physician for advice.**”

These brands were featured prominently in a video that advocated their use for “oral, anal and vaginal sex.”

And here’s what the Board of Education itself thinks about “anal sex”:

“The message referenced in the details below was not delivered due to inappropriate content. It surpassed the threshold set in the Adult Content dictionary.”
